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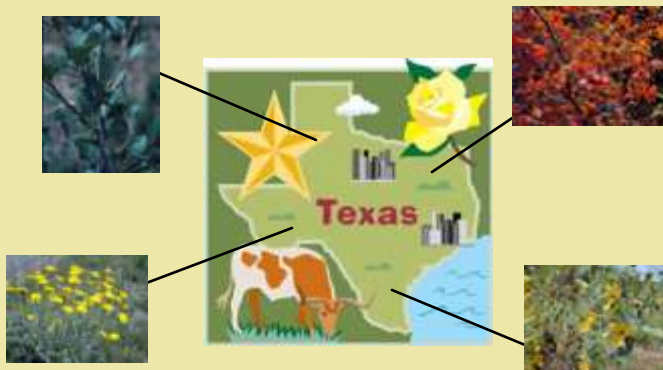

Raising Roses in West Texas

Master gardener Nell Rains is introducing her native West Texas to a new kind of rose. Roses are thought to be hard to grow without hours of maintenance and care, but Earth-Kind roses are hardy — even in West Texas' harsh elements.

Earth-Kind is the trademark Texas AgriLife Extension gives to types of roses that have gone through years of testing and prove to be the most resilient plants. Today there are 21 varieties of roses that have been designated Earth-Kind. Along with the scientific research at universities, others like Rains have been doing observational field tests. Rains is currently growing several of Dr. Griffin Buck's roses in a field test outside her rural home near Edmonson.

Rains, who was born and raised in Hale County, is a "farmer by profession and a gardener by choice." She decided to become a Master Gardener by participating in training and becoming certified through Texas A&M. The Master Gardener position is a volunteer capacity through which she gives horticulture advice based on scientific information. Rains also is a certified national Earth-Kind rose specialist, which comes after study, research and approval by the Earth-Kind team. "I have been a gardener since my days in 4-H," Rains said. "I've gardened for over 50 years. Rains has about an acre of winding pathways between luscious green trees and bushes dripping with rose blossoms. She also grows a variety of other plants, including peonies and herbs.

The Earth-Kind program is testing roses not only for the south, but for the entire nation. The name Earth-Kind suggests that these roses are more environmentally friendly than other roses, mainly because they need less watering and do not need harsh chemical pesticides or commercial fertilizer. Earth-Kind roses can grow any-

where in Texas and in any soil type. They are disease resistant as well as insect tolerant. Once established, Earth-Kind roses require little maintenance. To get established, the roses need to be planted in soil mixed with some compost material. To avoid rotting, the rose should not be planted in a basin where water can sit. Instead, the plant needs to be planted in a raised bed to promote drainage from the base of the plant. As with all roses, Earth-Kind roses should not be watered overhead but receive water at ground level. The rose also needs to be surrounded by three inches of mulch. The mulch keeps moisture in the soil and gradually breaks down to provide additional nutrients to the plant. Earth-Kind Roses also need direct sunlight for at least eight hours a day. They also need plenty of air circulation.

The rose varieties designated as Earth-Kind are: Marie Daly, The Fairy, Caldwell Pink, Knock Out, Perle d'Or, Belinda's Dream, Else Poulson, Carefree Beauty, Duchesse De Brabant, Spice, Mutabilis, Climbing Pinkie, Sea Foam, Ducher, Georgetown Tea, Cecile Brunner, La Marne, Mme. Antoine Marie, New Dawn, Reve d'Or and Souvenir de St. Annes.

Texas Master Gardener 2009 Annual Report

Master Gardeners continue to reach greater audiences in Texas

The Master Gardener program has trained 1,208 individuals increasing the number of volunteers to 6,393 Master Gardeners throughout the state. They have offered 520,144 hours of volunteer service which saves Texas AgriLife Extension 260 full time employees. This has a \$10 million dollar impact on the state of Texas. Master Gardeners answered 32,557 phone calls from citizens of their local communities. They have increased the number of youth gardens to 273 gardens. This is more than 65 new youth gardens in 2009. They have maintained 212 demonstration gardens and they continue to reach their audiences with 50 county web-sites.

One of the main goals of the Master Gardener program is to train individuals to teach citizens in their local and surrounding communities about horticultural topics. The Master Gardeners gave 2,614 presentations which have reached 153,847 individuals. The total of number of people receiving researched based information has continuously grown.



Master Gardeners are highly trained, passionate gardeners who serve their county and state to their fullest. It is because of their work and dedication that Texas AgriLife Extension can continue to reach greater audiences and expand their capabilities.

Specialist Training



Master Gardener Specialist Training- Citriculture July 29-30, September 2-3, (Session 3 TBA)

The popularity of growing citrus in the home landscape has grown significantly in recent years. Citrus is also an important horticultural crop in Texas agriculture. The future of successful citrus production in Texas, at the home or commercial level, hinges upon preventing the establishment and spread of Citrus Greening (CG) Disease in the state. Citrus trees infected with CG produce undesirable fruit and have a shortened lifespan. The disease is vectored by psyllid insects that have been detected in Texas. CG-infected trees have been found in Mexico, and several U.S. states, including Florida, California, and Louisiana.

The Texas AgriLife Extension Service is offering a Master Gardener Specialist training in citriculture during 2010 to enlist Master Gardeners' assistance for detection and prevention of CG. The MG Specialist-Citriculture training is a comprehensive educational program aimed at preparing Master Gardeners to grow citrus in the home orchard successfully and manage the challenging complex of associated insects and diseases, including CG. The two-day course will cover varieties, nutrition, frost protection, propagation, as well as identification and management of insects and diseases of citrus.

Due to the imminent threat of Citrus Greening, the MG Specialist-Citriculture training will be offered three (3) times in 2010. The first two sessions are as follows:

July 29-30, 2010, Fort Bend Co. Ag/Extension Center, 1402 Band Road, Rosenberg, TX, hosted by Fort Bend Co. Master Gardeners.

September 2-3, 2010; The Neighborhood Place, 3014 Rivas St., San Antonio, TX 78228 hosted by Bexar Co. Master Gardeners.

The date and location of the third session are To Be Announced.

Participants for each session must be preregistered by their County MG Coordinator/Agent and approved by the MG Specialist Training Coordinator (Monte Nesbitt, Extension Program Specialist). Due to the urgency in training Master Gardeners to detect and mitigate movement of CG, priority is being given to individuals who reside in counties from Williamson County (Georgetown) and south. If available seats are not taken by Master Gardeners in this "citrus zone", other Master Gardeners in Texas interested in the training will be invited to attend one of the three sessions. Fee for the course is being specially priced at \$85/person, because of state grant awards for CG prevention. Registration fee includes educational materials and three meals.
